Internet Safety Tips:

We've all told our children not to talk with strangers. So why is it we let them "Chat" with strangers on the internet? There is a growing problem with online predators, who are trying to talk with our children every day. Even with the success of the Dateline NBC's "To Catch a Predator" show there are still more predators waiting in line to get a chance to talk with a youngster and arrange a meeting. It is our jobs as parents to protect our children from these individuals. This article will provide a basic understanding of the statistics, rules, and tools as it pertains to internet safety.

Statistics:

70% of children on the internet have received a message from someone they didn't know.

14% of the children interviewed stated they had met someone in person who they met online.

40% of those receiving messages from someone they don't know; replied and chatted with them.

1/3 of children on the internet have seen unwanted sexual material.

1 out of every 7 child has received a sexual solicitation.

33% of those interviewed stated their parents know little or nothing about what they do on the internet (48% of 16-17 year-olds)

These statistics should wake you up. There are predators on the internet looking for victims. We need to educate our children and ourselves. We need to talk with our children and establish rules for using the internet. We also need to look into technology that can help us provide a safe environment. Probably the best advice I can give is to monitor your children's internet activities. This is best accomplished by placing the computer in a common area. Placing the computer anywhere else, especially a bedroom will only make your child more vulnerable.

Rules:

You need to sit down with your children and talk with them about the rules for using the computer and going on the internet. It is important that they know what they can and cannot do. They need to know there are predators out there. One good rule is; "Chat with people you know. NO ONE ELSE!". Although they love to chat with friends, it is imperative that parents establish these boundaries.

Other possible rules could be:

No adding software to the computer without asking.

You can only be on the computer for 1 hour a day.

Don't visit any websites without checking with parent.

Most importantly, they need to know that if something happens on the computer that is inappropriate, confusing, or threatening, they are to tell you. I believe this area is very under reported. If someone sends one message, that's one thing. But if someone is continually sending inappropriate messages it needs to be looked into.

Tools:

Firewall software. There are many software companies that provide firewall software that can limit the activities in and out of your computer. This software not only can help protect your children from unwanted material being displayed on the computer, but can help provide security to protect your computer from malicious software. Make sure you have software that blocks "Popups".

Monitoring software. There are some software packages that allow you to discreetly install the product which will log all in/out bound instant messages and chat room conversations. This allows you to monitor your children's conversations. This will also give law enforcement much needed evidence.

Monitor:

Monitor your children's activities. Know what they are doing, who they are talking with, and what information they are putting on the internet. Make sure you review the Internet History on a regular basis. This log will tell you what internet sites are being visited. You normally can find this log in C:\Documents and Settings\USERNAME\local Settings\History. If you can not find the history file, contact someone who is knowledgeable about computers. This log can be emptied, so make sure your child is not clearing it out. Tell them you want to review their internet activities. If your child has a MYSPACE account, have them give you the password so you can review their webpage. Make sure they are not putting information or pictures on the internet (for everyone to see) that you don't want out there.
